

Dear Parents/Guardians,

The Jewish Federation of Northern New Jersey has enabled cultural and educational exchanges between Northern New Jersey and Israel for the past 15 years. These exchanges have engaged and connected students and teachers from local New Jersey schools with their counterpart schools in Israel. Educators have shared curricula and best practices, and taught model lessons together while students have learned alongside one another and participated in collaborative projects and study.

For the past five years, Jewish Federation has partnered with Bergen County Academies to carry out a specialized exchange program for STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) students—The Scott Pazer STEM Exchange. By embarking on this initiative, our educators and students have been able to participate in an immersive experience in this area of study in Israel, while widening their cultural perspective. Each year of the Scott Pazer STEM exchange has had a specific area of focus. In 2020, students and teachers will be involved in coral conservation research, carrying out several days of hands-on field work with experts in the field at the Red Sea, in the south of Israel.

This type of exchange has strengthened and diversified our school's STEM program and has introduced our students to peers from many different cultures. We continue to expand our connections to organizations and educational institutions around the world to further our commitment to prepare our students to live, work, and lead in a global community.

The year is flying by! First, a recap of Trimester 2 College and Career events:

Fall College Tour: 48 BCA students and 4 counselors traveled to experience the "Best of the Midwest" visiting University of Chicago, University of Illinois-Urbana Champaign, Northwestern University, Notre Dame University, Purdue University, and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Students and counselors met with many BCA alumni, saw the latest developments on campus and enjoyed hearing updates from admission officers.

FROM OUR GUIDANCE DEPARTMENT

Independence and Self-Advocacy in High School

Navigating through adolescence can be difficult in a variety of ways. While all high school students deal with the challenges of adjusting to a higher level of academic rigor and the innate desire to find the right social fit, at BCA our students are also met with the need to become independent self-advocates from the outset of their time on campus. While there are obvious benefits to the trust that we put into our student body, with this freedom comes the necessity for students to develop a mature understanding of their study habits, learning styles and personal needs early on. While many students are naturally savvy at reaching out to their teachers for extra help, speaking up in class and meeting with their school counselor, others find that they need to cultivate this skill. Understanding how best to advocate for oneself is critically important to develop during high school since collegiate life requires a high level of independence. Our department has created a list of suggestions to help our students find their voice and push past the potential discomfort to ensure individual success.

Remember that you are a student and are not expected to know everything!

One of the biggest fallacies for BCA freshman is that their intelligence alone will carry them through. Perhaps a student never had to ask for help in middle school since the material just came easily to them. Assume that this will not be the case moving forward. Raise your hand, ask questions and individually talk to your teachers about your strengths and weaknesses. You will be surprised how empowering it is to allow yourself to ask for help and how appreciative your teachers will be to know you better as a learner. Define success in your own way and not through the eyes of your peers.

All too often students feel threatened and frustrated by the apparent achievements of their peers. In the hallways and at lunch, some students freely discuss their grades which can often make it seem that everyone has superior marks. In reality, this is not the case and it is important to recognize that we all have our own individual strengths and weaknesses, as well as good and bad days in class. If you do not feel satisfied with your grades, rather than just feeling frustrated – do something about it. Discuss your study techniques with your teachers, get a NHS tutor and strategize better organizational techniques with your school counselor. All you can realistically ask of yourself is to do your best and put a reasonable amount of effort into your academic work.

Explore your interests – even if they are outside of your academy!

One of the best things you can do for yourself during high school is to learn more about what you love, what stimulates your curiosity and what you have a passion for. For some students, their focus has been clear for years and they continue to cultivate this interest through their academy classes. Try not to be frustrated if this is not your story. One of the best ways to be your own self-advocate is to explore a variety of electives in new academic disciplines. Once you find something that you love, you will be surprised at how much academic motivation can be derived from an internal desire to learn more!

Give yourself a break and take time for yourself.

Yes, you are at one of the best high schools in the country. Yes, you have a lot of work to do. We know this and we support you in your quest to succeed, but remember that before all else comes your health. Make sure to take time for yourself and try to create a schedule that allows for breaks, ample sleep, free time and fun. If you are healthy and happy, you will naturally be inclined to focus more and achieve academically. Knowing when you need time for yourself and managing your time effectively is critical both at BCA and beyond.

SkillsUSA Community Service Team

This year, the BCA SkillsUSA Community Service team - made up of three ACAHA

students from the Class of 2021 - has been working relentlessly on a project to spread awareness and take action for food insecurity. They have been working closely with the Community FoodBank of New Jersey, the largest anti-hunger organization in the state, in an effort to better educate students about the issue of hunger and provide aid for the cause. On January 24th, the team led an interactive workshop about food insecurity during BCA's International Day of Acceptance. During this workshop, students were split up into groups where they were given a food security level and different amounts of money based on this level. Then, each group had to create three healthy and nutritious meals. After comparing their meals, students found that those who were food insecurefound it difficult to put together three healthy meals and had to think

much more about what they were purchasing.

Creating meals that are both healthy and inexpensive is incredibly challenging, and one of the reasons why the food insecure often struggle with health complications. One main approach



to helping those who are food insecure is through promoting healthy and inexpensive options.

The Community Service team currently runs a YouTube Channel, called feednj_bca, which creates inexpensive, delicious, and most importantly, nutritious recipes and shares the recipes. The team also runs an Instagram account, @feednj_bca, to spread awareness about the issue of food insecurity and share the steps they are taking to prevent it.

In addition, the Community Service team worked hard to plan and run a school-wide food drive at Bergen County Academies to collect food donations for the Community FoodBank of New Jersey. Each IGS classroom received a box and competed with each other to win a free breakfast. Thanks to the generous contributions made by BCA students, the community service team was able to collect over 500 food products to donate to the FoodBank. Inspired by their work within the school, the P.B.A. Local 134 of the Bergen County Sheriff's Department got involved by presenting the team with a \$500 check to the Community FoodBank of New Jersey, an amount equivalent to 1,500 meals, as well as collecting food for the drive. Along with all their efforts, the Community Service team and volunteers from the SkillsUSA club, volunteer their time to sort food products at the Community Food Bank.

During their last volunteer shift, the group managed to sort 992 food products!

The SkillsUSA Community Service team continues to encourage everyone to get involved in their community. Whether that involves bringing in a canned good or volunteering a few hours of their time, they believe everyone should take action in order to help solve this important issue.







On Saturday, January 25, 2020, the Bergen County Academies held its annual BCA Flash event, teaching middle school students in Bergen County a variety of courses ranging from robotics to beginner's bookbinding. This year, the Bergen County Academies SkillsUSA Chapter partnered with the Academy for Culinary Arts and Hospitality Administration (ACAHA) to run an introductory course to culinary arts. Two 2-hour sessions were organized in an effort to introduce middle school students to basic food handling and kitchen safety procedures, as well as basic preparations of sweet and savory treats. BCA's SkillsUSA members first taught a presentation on the kitchen procedures used within our facility, and were then introduced to the preparation of french apple tarts and chocolate chip cookies through live demonstrations.

The BCA SkillsUSA American Spirit team, consisting of three ACAHA juniors, spearheaded the classes, while culinary instructor, Chef John Branda, supervised the safety presentations and live demonstrations to ensure that the event ran smoothly. More than 15 SkillsUSA members from the freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior classes volunteered their time to aid in pre-preparation and class assistance.

The Intro to Culinary course was a huge success thanks to the participation and commitment of so many dedicated members of ACAHA. Properly presenting the myriad of different skills often practiced in the culinary academy in such a short amount of time was quite difficult, but was strongly enforced and emphasized by each student teacher, every step of the way. The great popularity and immensely positive feedback can only mean one thing: the Intro to Culinary course can only return next year better than before!





Spring Session, 2020 March 16th to May 26th

3D Printing

Thursdays (Grades 5-8)

Come explore the world of 3D Printing and learn how you can create something truly original. This class will introduce students to basic 3D computer-aided design (CAD), as well as the possibilities offered by 3D Printing. Students will learn how to design and print their own creations, access open source models online, and utilize this technology for competitions and science fairs. No experience necessary.

Acting & Improv

Mondays (Grades 5-7)

In this course, students will learn about different kinds of acting and the techniques actors use. The acting focus will be creating strong characters and committing to those choices. We will play improv/ theatre games, read and act out excerpts from plays, and use our real life to tap into our inner superstars!

Advanced Python

Saturdays (Grades 5-7)

This course is designed for those who have taken Python 101 or have equivalent experience with programming, this class goes a little deeper, into subjects like arrays and lists, algorithms, finite-state automata (FSA), and domain space mapping. Our culminating goal will be for you to program a tic-tac-toe program with a computer player that can be made intelligent enough to be unbeatable.

Cool Chemistry

Wednesdays (Grades 5-8)

This laboratory hands-on course will excite students when they learn how and why various chemical phenomena work. They will perform mini experiments to see why fireworks display so many colors, investigate what colors make up ordinary ink, experience the power of atmospheric pressure, learn what makes light sticks work, watch how you can boil water at room temperature or in a paper cup, and many others! Each session will begin with a brief lesson describing the scientific principles that will be witnessed that day before conducting the fascinating experiments. This chemistry class will be sure to create a reaction! Materials Fee: \$10.00

Crazy Biology

Tuesdays (Grades 5-8)

In this course we will take a look at the wild world of biology, looking at the basics of this life science as it pertains to the world of the most bizarre and interesting organisms on the planet! Materials Fee: \$10.00

Create Your Own Business

Saturdays (Grades 6-8)

Students will work collaboratively in cooperative groups to create their own businesses. Students will acquire understanding of the cost, licensing and advertising aspects of entrepreneurship. Students will design a product or create the service for their business. Students will tackle issues pertaining to name, location and type of business. They will also identify the best method to sell their products and services. Participants will enhance writing, analytical, speaking, public presentation, marketing, interviewing, Microsoft Office Suite and general business skill sets.

Essay Writing

Mondays (Grades 5-7)

In this course we will learn to effectively organize our thoughts into essays. Together we will explore personal essays, expository essays, persuasive essays and more. Students will sharpen their skills with editing and revising both in pairs and individually. The skills obtained in this course will be helpful for essay writing for in class tests, homework assignments, and standardized tests.

Do You Love to Debate?

Tuesdays (Grades 5-6)

This course develops the debate skill sets which include public speaking, note taking, research and listening. Students will learn how to execute impromptu and persuasive speeches. Debate has the potential to impact most aspects of a student's life as it provides an exceptional chance for students to cultivate and become proficient at life skills of oral communication and critical thinking.

Honors Algebra B

Thursdays (Grades 6-8)

This course emphasizes the development of problem-solving skills within the context of mathematics applied to science. Topics covered include graphing, linear and quadratic equations, inequalities, logarithms, algebraic trigonometry, and polynomials. Knowledge of pre-algebra, including operations with positive and negative numbers, is expected.

MathCounts Training Camp

Wednesdays (Grades 5-8)

MATHCOUNTS° is a math enrichment and competition program for middle school students involving a series of fun and engaging contests up to the national level. This course motivates and challenges students as they develop strong math skills for the competitions. The class will cover teambuilding, communication, and rapid response, as well as the MATHCOUNTS° topics: Counting, Probability, Statistics (Mean, Median, Mode), Patterns, Pythagorean Theorem, Area, Three-Dimensional Geometry, Proportions/Ratios/Percents, Algebraic Equations, and Number Theory.

Model UN

Mondays (Grades 5-7)

Do you like to debate? Do you like international issues? Then Model UN is for you! In this course we will learn about the current state of world affairs and how to argue and debate these issues using Model UN procedures. Students will use web resources to research the United Nations and other international bodies, as well as international issues. If you like learning about and debating international issues, this class is for you!

Non-Routine Problem Solving

Saturdays (Grades 5-8)

Students learn how to solve problems in number theory, logic, algebra, and geometry. Students work with experienced coaches and instructors in small, collaborative teams. They improve their problem-solving abilities by tackling challenges that involve creative thinking; they also learn strategies that can be applied to any kind of research. They are prepared to proceed beyond MathCounts to local, state, national, and international math competitions.

Pre-Algebra A

Wednesdays (Grades 5-7)

In this course we will explore mathematical concepts to prepare for algebra studies, including algebraic expressions, integers, equations, inequalities, decimals, fractions, ratios, proportions, percents, probability, area, and volume.

Pre-Algebra B

Wednesdays (Grades 5-7)

In this course we will explore mathematical concepts to prepare for algebra studies, including algebraic expressions, integers, exponents and square roots, number theory, decimals, fractions, equations and inequalities, ratios, conversions, rates, and basic statistics.

Programming 101 with Python 3!

Mondays (Grades 6-8)

Learning to code interesting programs is probably the most fundamental skill of the future. Python, is a great teaching language that is also very useful to professionals. Learn the basics of I/O (Input/Output), flow control (conditional statements and tests), loops and iterations, the use of functions, parameters, and returns, the use of data types. Advanced topics may include exception handling, objects and classes. Students will learn by designing and writing their own programs. No pre-requisites.

Worlds of Science

Yhurdays (Grades 5-8)

In this course, students will explore sciences like biology, chemistry and physics. Each class will begin with an exciting and interesting science demo which is a platform to dramatically "show" a scientific phenomenon and "tell" students about its underlying principles. Each demo prompts students' curiosity and develops both their critical-thinking and problem-solving skills. Students then design and perform experiments to further explore the scientific phenomenon and analyze data related to the underlying principles. Students will learn about the process of scientific experimentation, research skills, data collection, and analysis, and will gain experience in explaining and presenting their results. Materials Fee: \$10.00

Writing for Literature

Mondays (Grades 7-8)

Using various genres, this class will teach you the skills and techniques for analyzing, discussing, and writing about literature. Students will respond to the works both through class discussion and in-class writing . You will then get individual feedback to improve your writing skills. This is an ideal class for students who want to improve their writing or who want to get some experience with the kind of writing found in the new SAT.
